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Don't Let Your Tires Get Tiredž& If They Do, Recycle!

Stockpiled tires continue to pose a health and environmental threat throughout California and the nation.

Waste

tires can serve as a nesting area for pests and a breeding ground for mosquitos which can spread encephalitis and other illnesses. Waste tires can also catch fire and release toxic smoke.

Department, encourages you to recycle vour used tires. And, to take steps to

prolong the use of your tires, before they need to be recycled.

Tired Tires

- Rotate your tires every 4,000 to 8,000 miles (refer to your automobile manual).
- Check your tire pressure once a month when your tires are "cold" (before driving more than one mile). With the correct amount of air pressure, tires wear longer, save fuel and help prevent accidents.

- Keep your wheels aligned and your tires balanced.
- Do not overload your vehicle.
- Observe posted speed limits.
- If vehicle becomes stuck, do not spin the tires.
- It is often unneccesary to replace all four tires at the same time.

Tire Facts

- Each year, 21 million barrels of oil and \$2.2 billion are wasted due to under-inflated tires.
- Underinflation overloading can cause tire failure.
- Under-inflation of just five pounds can shorten a tire's life by up to 20%.
- Each year, about 30 million used tires are generated in California. Only 60% of these used tires are being recycled for re-treading, rubber products, asphalt, energy production and other uses.
- Each year in California, about 12 million used tires are placed in landfills or illegal dumps.



Buy the Better Tire You can extend the life of your

tire, save space in our landfills, increase driving safety, and save money when you buy



quality tires. You should buy tires: with higher treadwear ratings. A tire with a treadwear rating of 200 would be expected to last twice as long as a tire with a rating of 100;

- with higher traction ratings. Traction ratings from highest to lowest are AA, A, B, and C;
- that can stand up to high temperatures. Heatresistant ratings, from highest to lowest, are A, B, and C.
